Claim Update

School Finance (SF) will resume posting payments Tuesday mornings, allowing Sponsors to be paid via direct deposit on Fridays. CACFP Claims are typically posted the first four Tuesdays of each month. Center and Sponsor Claims in "Approved" status by 8:00 a.m. each applicable Tuesday morning will be paid that week. Claim Update - Home Sponsoring Organizations Only

March claims must be in "Pending Approval" status by 3:00 p.m. Monday, April 22, 2024, so that payments can be directly deposited on Friday, April 26, 2024.

New USDA Guidance & Resources

Proposed Rule: Serious Deficiency Process in the CACFP & SFSP

On February 21, 2024, Food and Nutrition Service published the Proposed Rule entitled "Serious Deficiency Process in the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) and the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP)" in the Federal Register. The proposed rule can be viewed here: Federal Register Notice

Through this proposed rulemaking, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) is proposing important modifications to the serious deficiency process in CACFP, extending the process to CACFP unaffiliated sponsored centers, and establishing a serious deficiency process in SFSP. These changes will improve consistency in language and process among statute, regulations, and guidance for both CACFP and SFSP. Additionally, these changes will improve consistency in the serious deficiency process within and across States and strengthen program integrity.

This rule also proposes updates to the suspension process in CACFP and proposes options on implementing suspension in SFSP. Additionally, this rule proposes options on termination and disqualification procedures for school food authorities that operate SFSP and CACFP. SFSP 08-2024 Non-Congregate Meal Service in Rural Areas: Questions and Answers #2 25. Q. Could adults other than parents or guardians and with written permission on file from the household pick-up meals on behalf of parents or guardians?

A. No, only parents or guardians may pick-up meals on behalf of their children (7 CFR 225.16(i)(2)). Other adults (i.e., proxies) may not pick up meals without the child(ren) present.



27. Q. Is it permissible for a childcare provider, such as a day care operator or childcare center operator, located in a rural area to collect meals for the children who attend their childcare services?

A. No, childcare providers cannot collect Program meals on behalf of parents or guardians for children attending their childcare. Childcare providers who care for whole groups of unrelated children formally enrolled in their care should not be considered guardians under the State agency's definition. Allowing a childcare provider to collect and distribute meals on behalf of groups of children introduces significant integrity risks, especially concerning meal duplication, ensuring meals reach eligible children, and food safety risks during transportation, storage, or distribution. In cases where children in childcare settings could benefit from non-congregate meals, FNS strongly encourages State agencies and sponsors to collaborate with local childcare providers. They should explore the feasibility of these providers becoming summer meal sites or participating in the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) to support meals for children in their care.

30. Q. Can non-congregate home delivery service be provided at addresses where the child does not reside?

A. No. As outlined in Program regulations at 7 CFR 225.14(d)(6), non-congregate meal delivery should only be sent directly to a child's residence with prior written consent from a parent or guardian. Non-congregate home delivery may not be sent to daycare home programs, short-term rentals, or vacation properties.

Request to Use Electronic Transactions in Child Nutrition Programs

Sponsors who wish to use an online or accept electronic signatures on any child nutrition form, including the Consent for Disclosure, must complete the Request to Use Electronic Transactions in Child Nutrition Programs form located in Chapter 7 of Food Service Facts. The Request to Use Electronic Transactions in Child Nutrition Programs form must be completed annually and returned to CNW at cnw@ksde.org. Parents and caregivers can also text the word "FOOD" or "COMIDA" to 304-304 to find the nearest meal sites through the No Kid Hungry Hotline.

The Heartland Farm to ECE Institute

The Heartland Farm to Early Care and Education (ECE) Institute program application is now available! The Heartland Farm to ECE Institute is a year-long program aimed to create new or expand existing Farm to ECE efforts in the cafeteria, the classroom, and the community.

Eligible applicants must participate in either the CACFP or the NSLP, and serve an ECE program such as a Head Start, Early Head Start, Child Care Center, or Preschool OR be a sponsoring organization of the CACFP.

Participation in the Institute is free. The program will kick off with a retreat November 13-15, 2024, in Nebraska City, NE at the Arbor Day Farm Lied Lodge. Registration, lodging and meals for the retreat are included in program. Following the retreat, participants will have one-on-one support from a coach throughout the program to set goals and implement activities. Regular meetings with the state agencies and partnering organizations will also take place for resources, technical assistance, and training. The program will conclude October 2025.
